Learning Challenge—How do things move?	
	<p>This half term we will be starting our new learning challenge "How do things move?" During this learning challenge, we will be exploring a range of toys and thinking about how they work. The children will be introduced to push and pull forces and how these actions give energy to various toys. The children will be taking part in challenges to make toys move faster and further by exerting more force and be introduced to measuring distance. We will be introducing our new learning challenge by taking a range of large toys on to the big playground and exploring how to make them move, as well as exploring the forces needed to climb the climbing frame and slide down the slide. The learning challenge will culminate in a morning of box modelling to which parents will be invited. You will have the opportunity to help your child make vehicles or toys out of junk modelling. Details will be provided closer to the time.</p>
<p>Letters and Sounds</p> 	<p>The nursery curriculum consists of a balance between child-initiated and adult-led activities. A daily letters and sounds session is one of the planned adult-led sessions and is integral in developing the children's awareness of sounds in words and their readiness for reading in Reception. This half term, some children will be focussing on rhyme and rhythm. They will learn about the syllables in words and copying and creating a range of rhythms as well as learning how to match rhyming words. Other children will be introduced to oral blending and segmenting. They will learn how sounds go together to create a word as well as how to split words up into individual sounds.</p>
	<p>Reading We will continue to reinforce the features of books and how to read them, such as the front cover, tracking the words from left to right, recognizing story structures and using story language to retell and act out stories. The children will also be introduced to non-fiction books and the features found in these types of texts. We will also try to follow an instruction book to try to make a rocket!</p> <p>Speaking and Listening All of the activities planned in the nursery are designed to encourage speaking and listening at all levels through child-initiated and adult-led activities. We have set up a new garage role play area to encourage this and will spend time in here modeling good use of role play language, listening skills and turn-taking.</p>

Subject	
Mathematics 	<p>In maths, the children will continue to learn about number recognition and counting. The numbers used will be personalised to each individual child based on their prior knowledge. These will range from 1-20. The children will be learning how to count out amounts as well as counting set amounts given to them. This will be taught within a range of fun and exciting practical games.</p> <p>We will continue to reinforce concepts such as 2D shape, size, pattern, positional language and times of the day. The children will also be introduced to weight and data handling, in the form of pictograms.</p>
Physical Development 	<p>As part of developing the children's fine motor control, a range of carefully planned activities and resources are available for them to use as part of their child-initiated time. These include resources like scissors, hole punches and split pins, threading, nuts and bolts, playdoh and a range of writing equipment. There are also a range of writing opportunities at different levels around the areas of the nursery. We encourage the children to either write their own name on their pictures or have a go at writing over the top of our writing. We also encourage them to add more detail to their pictures at each child's individual level e.g. adding a body/fingers/hair. This is to build on the children's prior skills.</p> <p>The children will also have many opportunities to develop their gross motor control through adult-led PE sessions and child-initiated outdoor play. We have a range of small equipment such as bats, balls, hoops and bean bags as well as bikes, scooters and climbing equipment for the larger movements.</p> <p>PE will continue to be held on Monday mornings in the school hall. We would greatly appreciate your support on these days in asking you to ensure that your child is wearing suitable clothes for moving around easily and safely, and socks and footwear that are easy for them to remove and put back on themselves. This also provides your child with the opportunity to become more independent in their own self care.</p> <p>This half-term, the children will be learning how to travel over, under and around a range of apparatus. They will also learn how to jump off apparatus and land safely.</p>

Library

The nursery library sessions will continue to be on Monday mornings, after the PE session. The children will still have the opportunity to choose a book to take home and share with their family. Their book does not need to be changed on a weekly basis if they would like to keep it for a longer period of time. Please support us and continue the children's learning by discussing features like the front cover, the title, characters and story structure when sharing the book with them. The children also visit the school library every Tuesday morning where they are able to choose a book to look at independently and then listen to a story as a group.

Outdoor play and exploration

The children spend time outside in the nursery playground everyday. This involves riding bikes and scooters, exploring and using the climbing frames and digging in the soil. Please ensure that your child has appropriate footwear and clothing so that they are warm and dry whilst exploring the outdoor area. These clothes will get dirty so please don't wear your Sunday best!
